Why the Balkans you may ask? Well I befriended 4 lovely ladies whilst in Japan last year, and we had been to Ireland in March together and decided we wanted to go 'somewhere different'.

Our tour started with 5 nights in Tirana, the Capital of Albania, our hotel being on the main square and we were told that it was where all the 'Spies' had met during the day!!!!


It is certainly not a 3rd world country as many believe, and I can see it as an up and coming holiday destination with beautiful scenery and many places of interest to visit. It was of course where Mother Teresa was born. At St. Paul's Cathedral in Tirana, there is a wonderful picture of her all made out of shells. Very impressive.



We were also taken to visit one of the seven hundred and fifty thousand, yes that is seven hundred and fifty thousand nuclear bunkers they have in Albania!!!!

The average temperature for the week was 33/34 degrees, bit too hot for my liking!! We were taken to many Monasteries and Fortresses, but am afraid to say that the walk to some of them had very long steep and uneven stone paths which I found difficult so can't report on their beauty. On the ones I did manage to visit, they were quite spectacular.


The 2nd half of the tour took us over the border into North Macedonia. Our base for 6 nights being in Ohrid, one of the country's prettiest places. Our hotel overlooked the lake, and again the scenery was beautiful. Glad to say it was not as hot as the previous week.



One of the trips took us to Skopje, Macedonia's Capital. It had been destroyed by an earthquake in 1963 but has now been rebuilt to its former glory. On the day we visited Mavrovo National Park, afraid it poured with rain, so we viewed the highest mountains, lakes and dramatic gorges in Macedonia through 'misty' windows.



One of the highlights of the holiday for me was a boat trip over to St. Naum's Monastery, passing pretty villages en route. The walk up (uneven stone paths again) was well worth it, with views of the lake 'sparkling' in the sun. After lunch, we took a small boat out to see the hot springs bubbling away under the water. A magical peaceful 45 mins.



Ohrid itself was a very pretty town with smart shops (I bought a jacket) and restaurants and overlooked by the Church of St. Jovan Kaneo perched high on a clifftop.

The only drawback of the holiday was that there were 42 people on the tour. Far too many for my liking, as I like to get to know my fellow travellers, but have to say I thoroughly enjoyed myself.
