Rev Mike writes:

ON PROTESTING PEACEFULLY AND HUMANELY

I can understand why people have taken to the streets, often in their thousands, in support of the suffering masses of Gaza.

It would be welcome, nonetheless, if protesters were to express condemnation of Hamas whose iniquitous actions, all of two years ago, sparked a response which Israel felt to be justified.

I have sympathy with the views of those who drape themselves in Palestinian flags and yet the word ‘but’ finds its way, continually into my mind.

Have they forgotten that Iran has called repeatedly for Israel to be obliterated from the world map and funds terrorists, such as Hamas, to help achieve that end?

Has the Holocaust been wiped from their memory? Have protesters such a warped view of history that they can no longer comprehend the philosophy of *Never Again!*

What worries me most is that marchers seem to give little credence to the fact that their actions are stirring up racial hatred towards Jewish friends who made Britain their home generations ago and who have nothing to do with the actions of Israel based politicians.

Is it right that peace loving Jews must live their lives in fear?

One would have thought that the curse of antisemitism would, by now, have been consigned to history’s rubbish bin.

Instead of that it lives on, and marchers need to ensure that they are not contributing to an evil which is an indelible stain upon our society.

I write in October 2025 and have just learned that supporters of a Jewish football team have been advised not to attend an international game at the Aston Villa Ground for fear that their presence will provoke violence on the part of fans who oppose the current political situation and, indeed, Jewish religious beliefs. The fear is that Moslem fans might react to them with aggression.

I was amazed to learn that Graig Guildford, Chief Constable of West Midlands Police, has given his support to such a course of action as he cannot guarantee 'to keep Israeli fans safe.'

What on earth has happened to our society? This cannot be right. The task of our Police is to keep all citizens safe – whatever their religion, views, or politics.

Prejudice has no place in modern society, and we must oppose it at every opportunity.

Meanwhile there is a ceasefire in Gaza and that is so welcome.

The situation there is nevertheless very fragile, and violence might well erupt again at any time.

I close with a plea that all the inhabitants of Israel and Gaza learn the words of a protest song with a difference. I use it again deliberately. Mark the words well.

*From the mountain to the sea,
May Palestinian / Israeli –
Learn to live in harmony,
Let each speak words of peace.
May there be a turn of tide,
As hearts and arms open wide,
To embrace the 'other' side,
And let all hatred cease.
No bullets, bombs, to kill or maim,
No missiles fired in faith's name,
An end to creeds – religion's shame,
And let love be increased.
Grant, O God, that ways be found,
To hallow other's holy ground,
And may 'Shalom' drown out the sound
Of war with words of peace.*



A visit to Westminster

October 28th, 6am and 47 of us from The Myrddin Presbytery were on the coach from Llanddarog and headed towards London. The purpose was to visit and support our local MP, Ann Davies, who is also an Elder of Cefnberach, a chapel within our Presbytery. 5 hours later and we were through security and shepherded by Ann herself into Westminster Hall where we were split into three groups with a tour guide. Our guide was very informative on the history of the Parliamentary buildings which were once the homes of the monarchy as well as being seat of government. But after the reign of Henry VIII, who favoured other residences, the palace became the official home of Parliament.

The Palace of Westminster has witnessed many significant scenes over the years, one of which has not been forgotten for over four hundred and twenty years, that being the Gunpowder plot of November 5th 1605.

Two hundred years later in 1834 a great fire broke out and destroyed most of the medieval palace but Westminster hall survived and the two architects, whose designs won the competition for the new Parliament, incorporated the Hall into the Gothic style new build. They were Sir Charles Barry and Augustus Pugin.

We spent a time in the Peers' Lobby and also in the House of Lords where unfortunately taking photos was not allowed. Also unfortunately we were not allowed access to the House of Commons due to the sitting of Parliament that day. However one or two did get the chance to get to the public gallery in both houses which made their day.

People were amazed at the splendour of the House of Lords and also at the starkness of the walls of Westminster Hall where the late Queen Elizabeth II had lain in state. Above the doorway to St Stephen's Hall was a circular glass art work named "The New Dawn" produced by Mary Branson to commemorate the campaigning of the suffragettes which led to some women gaining the vote in 1918. What was most amazing about this artwork was that its lighting is linked to the tides of the River Thames. It builds from low tide when only one disc is lit to high tide when the whole sculpture is illuminated.

After a photo shoot on the steps of Westminster Hall with Ann we were escorted to a room in Portcullis Hall where we were able to question Ann about her work and how she has found the transition from being a County Councillor to Member of Parliament. This ended with a short time of prayer and then it was to lunch and an afternoon of witnessing the hustle and bustle of city life amidst the sounds of sirens and gongs. A full and very interesting day.
