A Message from Minister



A Message for the members and friends of Y Babell/Zion Newydd

As I put pen to paper for the final time, following a period of just two years as minister in the Gwendraeth pastorate, I extend my warmest appreciation for the opportunity afforded me to work among you. In comparison, this second year has presented more challenges. Coronavirus has stifled any activity and testimony during these last four months but I have also seen less of you, particularly at home, given my decision to allow Corey to undertake the pastoral work, leaving me to concentrate primarily on the other nine chapels in the pastorate. I am not convinced that such division of labour necessarily works and it will need discussion as Mr Emyr Williams succeeds me (presuming the vote is successful) and endeavours to make his mark. Both he and Corey will need your prayers and, at times guidance and I wish them the best for the future.

Sadly we lost Gareth Davies following a protracted period of ill health at the end of May with his funeral being held on 5th June in the Royal Oak Chapel of Rest, Johnstown. These last few months were challenging to the family, particularly Gaynor and his siblings of whom Doreen of course is a faithful member. Gareth bore his illness with dignity, appearing to accept his impending fate with a quiet equanimity. Gareth's faith will no doubt have been of comfort to him, his having been baptised to Christ merely a year ago. I do admire the conviction shown by adults who choose to make their own decision as opposed to having it made for them as a baby, which is the route many of us will have taken.

On a happier note, it is wonderful to be able to relate that Mrs Nan Thomas celebrated her 90th birthday on 7th July. Such longevity can be attributed in the main to her positive, vibrant personality and a desire to keep active. It was only three years ago that Nan relinquished the role of pulpit secretary, work which she had carried out with efficiency, and a certain aplomb. We thank her for this and trust that she has many more active years in front of her!

I shall be moving back to Llanddewi-Brefi on 28th July, travelling down to the pastorate as and when required during August until my employment with the Presbyterian Church in Wales terminates following seventeen years' service. I shall then be caring for my father until Christmas after which my sister takes up the reins. From January, as you might be aware, I shall be working as a deacon initially but, within six months, as a priest in the Lampeter and Tregaron Local Ministry Area with the Church in Wales. It will present a new, exciting challenge and one I am looking forward to, God willing, with great excitement. I was brought up an Anglican and thus will be returning to my roots. If you decide to attend the National Eisteddfod next year I shall no doubt see you there!

I trust that by September you will feel safe enough to return to Babell/Zion Newydd. It will take encouragement, conviction and a determination to pass through the chapel doors for the first time after such an extensive period 'in the wilderness' but please do make the effort. The life and witness of the chapel needs you to be strong!

A Letter from the General Assembly

Dear Friends

The Executive Committee of the General Assembly Board (The Trustees) met today, 30th June 2020. The meeting discussed the decision of the Westminster Government to allow the re-opening of churches for public worship from 4th July 2020 in England. At the same time, we anticipate that a similar decision by the Welsh Government will come in the near future. As Custodian Trustees of Connexional property, the following was agreed:

- i) The Officers of the General Assembly will prepare guidance for the churches we have in England on the guidelines issued by the Westminster Government as soon as possible, and send them to the churches to help them prepare for a date when they will reopen.
- ii) As One Connexion, it was decided that none of our churches should be reopened until this could be done across the Connexion. When this is possible, we will inform you of the date when you may consider re-opening locally. In practice therefore, although it is legal to reopen our churches in England from July 4th, we do not think this is appropriate until we can move as one Connexion. When the churches are notified of the date to re-open, the decision to do this locally will be subject to the views of the Minister (where there is a Minister) and / or elders. We realize that this is affecting some churches that were planning to open from next Sunday, and we ask for your patience with this decision. Naturally, when the situation has changed in Wales, we will issue appropriate guidance and procedures to all our churches. Could you share this letter with your fellow elders and officers as well as your congregation.

Rev Mike Shephard writes

Dear friends, I tend to be quite controversial in my views and once upset people by daring to criticise the children's hymn, 'All things bright and beautiful.' I argued that the

author, Mrs Alexander, had an overly romantic view of nature and failed to take account of the harsher realities of life.

She refers to the little flower that opens but makes no mention of the plants that tempt insects inwards and then, having trapped them, feast on their blood. She waxes lyrical about the little birds that sing but fails to speak of the Butcher Bird that impales its victims on spikes, where they remain until it's time for the next meal. Much as I love the Robin, it does tend to be aggressive and territorial, and its lovely song is warning other birds to back off.

I am sure that the purple headed mountain looks majestic. What though of the volcano erupting in fury and causing immense damage to life and property?

The river running by is a glorious sight. But there is no mention of floods or, as in the winter of 2020, the untold misery which flooding can bring.

The cold wind in the winter can be invigorating if one is wrapped up warm. It is not so wonderful when a person is homeless and in danger of hypothermia. We all love the touch of the pleasant summer sun. But too much of it can bring drought and misery to millions. It is also sunshine that causes deadly skin cancers.

It is marvellous to enjoy the ripe fruits in the garden. The shame is that some people have no harvest to celebrate and have to carve out a living on barren and unfertile soil.

We are grateful for our five senses, especially that of sight. But what of children born with cancer of the eye? What of those who are blind?

So many people use their lips, not to celebrate the wonders of the natural world but to utter cries of anguish and pain; or to pray for a deliverance which doesn't come.

The hearers were angry because I had sat in judgement on what was, at the end of the day, a children's song. I responded that we should not be teaching children things which they will have to unlearn in later life.

Why didn't Mrs Alexander devote a verse to insect life? Then I could have spoken of the Cicidomyian gall midge, whose young hatch inside their mother and literally eat their way out, devouring the mother as they go? She might have enthused about the Xenon peckii fly, sightless and flightless, which spends its entire life inside the innards of a paper wasp, feeding on it. When writing about rivers she could have included the Amazon's Candiru catfish that swims its way up the uretha of an unsuspecting bather, then, extends its sharp spines, causing excruciating pain that can only be mitigated by surgical removal. It makes my eyes water even thinking about it!

Nor does she mention bad bacteria or organisms such as Coronavirus 19, which, in recent months has been the cause of worldwide pandemic, death, and chaos.

We must be honest enough to view the world in a realistic way. Here are some thought provoking words of Emerson:

How the world is managed or why it was created I cannot tell, but it is no featherbed for the repose of sluggards. Nature is no sentimentalist. She does not cosset or pamper us. Providence has a wild, rough, incalculable way to its end, and it is of no use to try to whitewash its huge, mixed instrumentalities, or to dress up that terrific benefactor in the clean shirt and white collar of a student in divinity.

This is a harsh world and not one of us will get out of it alive! Meanwhile we must strive to make it a kindlier place for those who come after us – the kind of world where menaces such as Covid 19 – become no more dangerous than the common cold to which it is related.

It is an immense challenge and will involve pain and loss and sacrifice along the way. Humankind will, however, triumph in the end. To quote the words of a song sang by Michael Ball and Captain Tom:

When you walk through a storm hold your head up high and don't be afraid of the dark. At the end of the storm there's a golden sun and the sweet silver song of a lark.

Those lyrics, recorded originally by Jerry and the Pacemakers, have a realism that 'All things bright and beautiful' lacks. Let us take the words to heart at this difficult time. If we listen very carefully we will hear the lark singing. All good wishes to you all, Mike

A Reflection

Isaiah chapter 43 verses 18-23

But the Lord says" Do not cling to events of the past or dwell on what happened long ago. Watch for the new I am going to do. It is happening already- you can see it now".

These are the words of the prophet Isaiah to the Israelites in captivity in Babylon. They were words of hope then and they offer hope and comfort for us today. We have heard many times during the last few weeks from various directions that we hope we don't go back to the way we were. The prophets of the Old Testament were wise in that they read the signs of the times and were mouthpieces for the Lord. Jesus often referred to the prophets and applauded the tradition of the prophets. Some would say that we should be like the prophets and that the church must be prophetic and see what God is telling us through these times and how we can adapt to new situations and a new calling. I enjoy reading Patience Strong's Thoughts For the Day and this week included this very timely illustration. We are all on life's journey and are called to do different things for the Lord in different places. Saul who later changed his name to Paul thought that he was doing God's work by going to Damascus but the unexpected happened and he was stopped in his tracks. He had gone to persecute but he himself was baptized, he had gone to give orders but in fact he fell on his knees and asked: "Lord, what wilt thou have me to do?" Sometimes we are turned aside from our purposes and brought to a sudden stop. We may resent that we are not allowed to follow our own paths but we must learn to look for God in everything that happens. In the words of Patience Strong;" The thwarting of your desire may be a divine waylaying."

As we reflect on these words in our own lives, we wish our Minister well as the next chapter of the journey unfolds, a decision which must have come after a great deal of consideration as to where and how best he can serve the Lord. Last week we reflected on the characteristics of a Christian and the Apostle Paul has a comprehensive list in his letter to the Galatians Chapter 5 verses 22-23.


This was Catrin's challenge: For every letter of your name describe the characteristics of a Christian. Why not have a go with your own name?
