Preserving and Promoting Llangunnor

Cory writes:

I love food.

As I'm writing this, I'm also watching Rick Stein travel around Shanghai, as he showcases beautiful, local Chinese seafood dishes.

And my mouth is watering.

But what, if anything, does food have to do with the Christian faith?

More than you might think.

I've actually spent the last six months preaching about food and the Bible, particularly the Gospel of Luke, because food is so central to the gospel and to Jesus' ministry. But it's something that we don't often talk about.

As Robert Karris has written, 'In Luke's Gospel, Jesus is either going to a meal, at a meal, or coming from a meal. References to food abound on almost every single page of Luke's Gospel.'

Indeed, 'a meal is the orienting metaphor for the Christian tradition,' says Jennifer Ayres, in her book *Good Food: Grounded Practical Theology*. 'Within every meal...is embedded an invitation to both divine encounter and moral responsibility.'

Let's briefly look at these two invitations together through the familiar words of Jesus in The Lord's Prayer: 'Give us this day our daily bread' (Luke 11:3), and see how we might respond.

Firstly, with every meal, we are invited to encounter God in and through our food. In Jesus' prayer specifically, we are invited to experience God through recognising our reliance on God as the one who provides for us and sustains us with good food (Genesis 1:12). When we enjoy a meal and learn of the complexities and depths of flavours, we can thank God for his creativity and provision for us. We can draw close to God and in our relationship with him through prayers of thankfulness and praise for this wonderful truth.

Secondly, through our food, we are invited to moral responsibility.

Any research into the global food system will show us its injustices. We recognise that some people have more than enough food, whilst others experience serious food poverty. Yet, the Bible starts out with a liturgy of abundance, a poetic reflection of God's generosity, and a reminder that there is enough for everyone in God's creation.

In the Lord's Supper, Jesus asks for daily *bread*. But, we recognise that, though God provides the natural ingredients for bread, it is human hands that bring them together to make bread. Thus, we are both reliant on God's provision and the global food system for our daily bread, and the invitation to moral responsibility comes through recognising and responding to our reliance on the system, and responding to its injustices.

And one very practical ways for us to respond to this invitation to moral responsibility is to do our best to find out where our food comes from. Buying Fair Trade food ensures that the farmers who produce our food are payed a fair and living wage, and that they are able to provide for their families. And buying locally, from local farmers, is also a great way to support our local economy and reduce the environmental impact of our meals. A great place to get started is www.carmarthenfood.com

By responding in this way, we recognise that all people are created in God's image and are deeply loved by him, and deserve a fair price for their work. We are invited to respond with grateful hearts to human creativity in producing good food and creating delicious recipes that reflect local cultures across the world.

There is amazing depth in the Scriptures in reference to food, and this is just one example. Yet, if we take these two invitations seriously, it can totally transform our attitude and experience of food each and every day.

I pray you are drawn closer to God's love and grace as you enjoy cooking, especially with family and friends. Have fun!

My South African Holiday 12th January 2019

"A World in one Country." That was the heading of the trip in the brochure. The holiday was with Saga, a holiday for "Solo's" and started when I was chauffer driven from the house to Heathrow for an overnight flight to Johannesburg. We stayed for I night in Pretoria where I met my fellow travellers.

The group comprised of 19 women and 8 men, and what a wonderful crowd of people they were. Everyone just "jelled" and one of the ladies, who I am sure I will see again, has a daughter living in Llanelli!!

The following 3 nights were spent at NKAMBENI Safari Camp in Kruger National Park. The accommodation was made up of tented/timber and canvas "lodges" which had an indoor and outdoor shower. Now I think one of the many highlights of the holiday for me had to be having a shower outside. I felt like one of the cast of "South Pacific." Kruger National Park. What can I say? We saw 4 out of the Big 5, only the Rhinos escaped us. The wildlife we saw are far too numerous to mention. Fantastic.



Day 5 saw us leave for Swaziland, now renamed EZULWINI. The scenery was breathtaking, with many stops en route. One being "God's Window," named, so they say, if God opened his curtains, that that would be the picture He would see. Two days of spectacular scenery. No wonder it is known as the "Switzerland of Africa."

Next, it's on to Zulu Land. There we visited a Zulu village, on the lines on St Fagans, and were treated to a typical "cultural show." We stayed at a most wonderful Country Lodge. Whilst there we were treated to another safari, and saw a beautiful lioness close up. A boat trip followed where we saw many hippos.

It's then down to Durban for an overnight stay before flying to Port Elizabeth. Our next few days were spent in a very pretty town called KNYSNA which was set beside a lagoon, and the start of the "Garden Route" to Cape Town.

The weather had been very hot throughout the trip and the only spot of rain we had was at KNYSNA. Went on a lovely old boat on the lagoon. I took an optional excursion to an ostrich farm where I had an ostrich "back massage" and I also stood on their eggs, so you can imagine how strong they are then!!!

Day 13 and it's down to a fishing village called ARNISTON via the spectacular OUTENIQUA Mountains. An absolutely superb place, with just the one hotel right on the oceans front. We were taken to Cape AGHULAS where the Atlantic and Indian Oceans meet. The hotel itself was one of the most charming hotels I have ever stayed at, with "real" milk in the fridge for your tea or coffee, plus Sherry (if you were so inclined) which was replenished daily!! One of the local ladies had started a small cottage industry, where she would give you a walking tour and talk through the small fishing village, followed by lunch at her cottage. On the way back to the hotel, we were taken to one of the original cottages where we were greeted by a lady sitting at the door with her bible open and was selling home made crafts. We noticed a hymn on the wall, and asked if she would sing it for us. Needless to say, I knew the tune and joined in!! We had a wonderful tour guide named Sharon who was South African. Her husband was a Pentecostal Minister, and she herself was a lay preacher. A truly lovely lady, and nothing was too much trouble for her.

Our tour was nearly over, with our final 3 nights at Cape Town. On arrival we were due to go up Table Mountain, but it was blowing a gale and couldn't go. Fortunately, next morning the wind had subsided and it was a very early start (still had to queue for $1\frac{1}{2}$ hours) and up we went. Amazing views from the top in glorious sunshine, with RUBBEN Island visible in the distance.

I was fortunate enough to meet up with a couple I had met on a cruise 13 years ago (and they remembered me). They took me to the Victoria and Alfred Water Front, a must see, and then onto their home for a cup of tea and a "catch up."

Our last day I went on an optional excursion around the "Cape Penninsular." An excellent trip which took us to The Cape of Good Hope, where the BENGUELA and MOZAMBIQUE currents merge. Very windy there, with one of our party being blown over 4 times. We did have some 300 schoolchildren from China, all in their yellow coats there at the same time.

The highlight of the tour took us to BOULDERS Beach where 2500 African penguins have established themselves. A sight to behold. A farewell dinner followed with a little bit of singing. It was a most enjoyable holiday and well worth the early morning starts and long road journeys. It certainly lived up to its name and was indeed "A World in one Country."
